SESSION ABSTRACTS

DISCUSSION 1: ARTS-BASED RESEARCH METHODS

Ashleigh A. Allen (poetry)

My dissertation research project explores the impact of centring a practice of care (through sharing stories, reading poetry, and writing poetry) with a small community of teachers and the effects of that practice and community on their lives, pedagogy, and curriculum.

benjamin lee hicks (graphic stories)

I use comic art as a medium for research communication about teacher professional learning because visual story-sharing offers both an opportunity and a risk: this approach acknowledges how we feel in a profession that asks for our whole hearts in practice, and then actively dissuades us from feeling too deeply or publically about the imperative for schools to expect, protect, and celebrate all who arrive there.

Diana Barrero Jaramillo

My research draws from transnational feminist approaches to memorialization of violence in post-conflict societies. In particular, my work examines how Colombian women use textile-based narratives to make visible their individual and collective demands for truth and justice.

Lindsav Cavanagh

I will be discussing my dissertation research project which uses arts-based dreammapping. The podcast team from the Toronto Writing Project
